Thank you to the Westlock C.O.P. members for hosting a great Workshop and Annual General Meeting weekend. In attendance were 122 members from throughout the province. Six R.C.M.P. Liaison Officers also attended.

Friday evening started registration and a light supper. Staff Sgt Dwayne Rawson, Liaison for the Westlock C.O.P., was the MC for the Workshop.

Welcome was received from the Town of Westlock, followed by the flag ceremony.

A round table discussion, led by Rick Carnegie from the Westlock C.O.P. group was the activity of Friday evening. Members were divided into five groups for the purpose of discussing any issues that were of concern. Each group prioritized the topics in order of importance to report back to the whole group. The final list will be provided to the A.C.O.P.A. Board for discussion.

Saturday morning saw an early breakfast starting at 7 am. Sgt Darryl Urano from the Emergency Response Team at "K" Division gave a very interesting presentation. There are two teams in Alberta, one in Edmonton and one in Calgary. The Emergency Response Teams get about 160 calls per year.. They perform law enforcement functions which exceed the capabilities of the regular police responders and address situations that require highly skilled weaponry, equipment tactics to successfully resolve high risk situations. Some of their calls support high risk search warrants, high risk arrests, high risk prison escorts, drug escorts, prison riots, special events security, and more.

S/Sgt Dwayne Rawson spoke to the group on Traffic Investigation with the use of the R.C.M.P. radio controlled helicopter that is used in accident reconstruction.

Cpl. Lee Grieco-Savoy spoke about Crime Scene Integrity and what to do if you come upon a crime scene. She was very passionate about preserving foot prints and gave a demonstration on how she lifts fingerprints for evidence.

Detective Chris Hayduk, from the Edmonton Police Service gave a presentation on Community Response to Urban Disorder. This is a group that Detective Hayduk organized, in his volunteer time, in response to the activities that were taking place where he lives.

After lunch, the A.C.O.P.A. Annual General Meeting was held. At the same time, the Liaison Officers had a breakout meeting. The rest of the afternoon was spent on an Eyewatch and Road Rally that saw all the participants get into vehicles and follow directions around the town of Westlock with several clues to watch for.

The Workshop ended with an excellent supper.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY



- Swords, Knives and other costume accessories should be short, soft and flexible
- Avoid Trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups with a trusted adult
- Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you
- Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat so you do not get sick
- Hold a flashlight to make it easier for you to see and be seen by others. Always walk, do not run from house to house
- Always test make up in a small area first. Be sure to remove it before bedtime to avoid a skin rash or irritation of the eyes
- Look both ways before you cross the street, Use established crosswalks wherever possible
- Lower your risk of eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses
- Walk on sidewalks when possible or on the edge of the roadway facing traffic to stay safe
- Wear a well fit mask, costumes and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips and falls
- Eat only factory wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers
- Enter homes only if you are with a trusted adult
- Only visit well lit houses. Don't stop at dark house
